William H. Kutteh, MD, PhD, HCLD, is a highly trained and experienced physician specializing in reproductive endocrinology and infertility in Memphis, Tennessee. A North Carolina native, Dr. Kutteh graduated with a major in biology from Wake Forest University

in Winston-Salem. He committed several years of graduate study at Duke University to research in ovarian cancer, followed by doctoral studies at the University of Alabama in Birmingham, where he received a doctorate in Molecular Cell Biology with a focus on immunology and the host response to disease. He received his medical degree from Wake Forest University School of Medicine, completed a residency in ob/gyn at the University of Alabama, and advanced his training with a fellowship in Reproductive Endocrinology at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School in Dallas.

Dr. Kutteh served in a faculty position at UT Southwestern until 1996 when he moved to Memphis to serve as the Director of the Division of Reproductive Endocrinology at the University of Tennessee. Currently, he holds the position of Clinical Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at

Vanderbilt University Medical Center and Professor of Gynecology at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, where he is Director of the Fertility Preservation Program.

Dr. Kutteh is board certified in Obstetrics and Gynecology, Reproductive Endocrinology, and Immunology. As an investigator, he has a highly productive research career that has been funded by the International Union Against Cancer, the National Institutes of Health, the American Cancer Society, as well as other agencies and organizations.

The author of >250 publications, he lectures nationally and internationally in his field. Dr. Kutteh was named among the "Top 1% of Reproductive Endocrinologists in the US" by US News & World Reports. He currently directs the Recurrent Pregnancy Loss Center and the Fertility Preservation Program at Fertility Associates of Memphis. He has been a member of the faculty of the American Society for Reproductive Medicine since 1990, the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology since 1994, and the European Society of Human Reproduction and Embryology since 1997.
